Introduction

Background

Australia's ageing population is becoming increasingly diverse, necessitating a thorough understanding of how culturally and linguistically diverse communities perceive and anticipate accessing aged care services.

Methods

Focus groups were conducted with participants from Greek, Latin American, Chinese, Tamil-speaking, and Muslim communities. The study examined awareness levels, information sources, perceived barriers to access, and decision-making processes regarding aged care services.

Selected Key Insights

BARRIERS TO ACCESSING AGED CARE

- Traditional values around family care are being challenged in the Australian context, often creating confusion and guilt.
- Contrary to assumptions in the sector, this research reveals no significant shift in attitudes towards aged care services among diverse communities in South Australia between first-and second-generation migrants.
- Beyond surface-level cultural accommodations, there's a misalignment between diverse worldviews and the Australian aged care model. For example, the individualistic approach of current assessment tools often clashes with collectivist cultural norms.
- The impact of negative publicity of the aged care sector is compounded by cultural factors, resulting in a trust deficit to the aged care system.

CENTRAL ROLE OF FAMILY IN AGED CARE DECISIONS

- For many diverse communities, family involvement remains a cornerstone in aged care decision-making processes.
- Decisions about aged care services are often viewed as collective family matters rather than individual choices
- Adult children frequently take on roles as informal carers and intermediaries in the aged care system.
- This central role of family in aged care decisions underscores the need for family-inclusive approaches in policy development and service delivery.

INFORMATION CHANNELS

- Emerging trend: Informal digital networks (e.g. community WhatsApp or WeChat groups) are increasingly filling information gaps.
- GP offices remain trusted information hubs for diverse communities, and for many, this is the first point of contact with information about aged care.

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Strategic Recommendations



Empower Families

- Shift from passive inclusion to active empowerment
- Introduce family liaison roles
- Propose policy changes for meaningful family involvement



Reshape Public Perception of the Sector

- Develop authentic success stories with diverse communities
- Launch targeted media campaigns addressing cultural concerns

Enhance Cultural Intelligence

• Implement tiered framework from frontline staff to leadership



Partner with Multicultural Organisations

• Create sustainable information networks



Boost Financial Literacy

- Develop programs for nextgeneration care recipients
- Address misconceptions



Develop Digital Engagement Strategies

- Establish presence on informal digital platforms
- Create intuitive, multilingual mobile apps
